Childhood and Development Association – Assiut is a private non-profit nongovernmental organization known as No. 451 of 1991 at the Ministry of Social Affairs and is considered the only association that started the specialized service in caring for children with mobility disabilities in Upper Egypt through voluntary efforts where regular visits were organized for a mobile team headed by Professor Dr. Jalal El Din Zaki Saeed is a professor of orthopedics and specializes in the care and rehabilitation of people with disabilities in Upper Egypt. Then the idea of establishing the association came and one of its most important purposes was:

- Social preventive services
- Treatment services
- Rehabilitation services

Then the association introduced the field of development to its fields of work to add a new dimension to its activities, which was elaborated in an integrated form for the process of participating effectively in the various development activities in its true sense and the association works through a clear vision and message.

Association mission

The association works in the villages of Assiut Governorate to enable the most needy groups to integrate, interact and positively in the community by providing direct services in providing and improving educational opportunities and caring for the disabled and improving the health, environmental and economic situation in those societies and empowering local NGOs to carry out their developmental roles and develop human resources in those societies To take responsibility for development and networking with NGOs in Assiut, to form a public opinion on the issues of marginalized people, and to coordinate with decision makers and relevant authorities with a view to providing a decent life for village residents.

Association Vison

The villages of the governorate of Assiut, whose residents enjoy the full exercise of all their human rights without discrimination and free from disabilities, violations and marginalized groups. The association is a strong institution capable of achieving sustainable development in societies influencing with the responsible authorities and dependent on their own resources and community resources.

COMMUNITY SCHOOLS PROJECT



The Community Schools Project works in the centers (Abnoub – Al–Sahel–Al–Fateh–Al– Badary–Al–Ghanayem–Al–Qousia–Dairut), which is funded by the Childhood and Development Association, and the project targets 4216 students

The overall goal

The Community Schools Project aims to increase educational opportunities for children who drop out of education. The method of education in these schools depends on the method of self-learning.

Target group

The direct: children who drop out of education are 4216 children (male 1781) (2437 females) – 257 teachers work in community schools – parents of school children.

Indirect beneficiary: Villagers

Project activities

– Technical and field follow–up of schools through the trained work team on managing community schools with an active learning methodology and writing periodic reports to observe the progress of students Holding some training for female teachers to raise the capabilities of female teachers.

- A committee for village affairs was established in all 125 centers, while remaining active members, attracting new members and educating them in turn towards schools.

SCHOOLS FOR EGYPT – ASSIUT PROJECT



Schools for Egypt project in Assiut Governorate, Abnoub and Al-Fateh districts, works in cooperation with the Sawiris Foundation for Social Development and the Orascom Construction Company. The project aims to provide high-quality educational opportunities .for 450 children who drop out of education

The overall goal

Contribute to providing high-quality educational opportunities for 450 children who drop out of primary school education in Assiut Governorate.

Target group

Direct Beneficiary: 450 pupils - 30 female teachers - 15 mentors

Indirect beneficiary: female teachers, mentors, parents, and the surrounding community

Project activities

 Implementation of a field survey in the number of four centers in Assiut Governorate, namely (Abnoub – Al–Fateh – Sadfa – Al–Qousia) to select the neediest villages.

– Al–Fateh and Abnoub centers were chosen due to the presence of the targeted children and donors within the two centers, which amounted to about 411 dropouts at Abnoub Center in 13 locations and 72 dropouts at the Al–Fateh Center at 5 sites.

 A statement of the proposed places has been prepared to open the nominated schools from the results of the field survey.



SCHOOLS FOR EGYPT PROJECT - QENA

Schools for Egypt project in Qena Governorate works in the centers of Farshout and Abucht in cooperation with the Sawiris Foundation for Social Development and Sunrise Egypt and Star Care Egypt. The project aims to provide educational opportunities for 450 children who drop out of education.

The overall goal

Contribute to providing high-quality educational opportunities for 450 children who have dropped out of primary school education in Qena Governorate

Target group

Direct beneficiary (450 pupils) indirect beneficiary (teachers, mentors, parents, and the surrounding community)

Project activities

DIGITAL SCHOOLS PROJECT

The Digital Schools project works in the governorates of Assiut, Sohag, Qena and Cairo, in cooperation with the Sawiris Foundation for Social Development and Orange Egypt Telecom, and the project targets the enrolled students in community school



The overall goal

Contributing to the development of the educational process in the elementary stage in schools for Egypt for 30 schools in the governorates of Assiut, Sohag, Qena and Cairo, with 900 pupils using information technology

Sub goals

1. Providing 30 schools for Egypt to 900 students with tablets.

2. Training of 60 female teachers on how to use tablets and applying assistive curricula to it.

3-Training of 9 technology development specialists on how to monitor and maintain tablet use in schools.

Rehabilitation of 2,500 socially, medically and educationally disabled children

Project results:

- (420) children with disabilities who have been medically rehabilitated

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT INITIATIVES PROJECT

PROJECT GOAL:

Strengthening the capacities of civil society organizations to achieve tangible social and economic gains for poor and marginalized rural communities in Egypt

Among the most important main objectives of the project:



- Establish networking and partnerships with the government sector, the private sector and the private sector at the local and national levels, in order to achieve the quality of activities and the continuation of the project.

- One of the most important roles of the project is achieving goals that meet the needs of the communities in which they operate and making tangible changes for the better at the level of community institutions and individuals and highlighting the most important resources and opportunities available and how to use them appropriately

Target groups through the project:

Funding 113 civil society institutions in four governorates: Alexandria, Beheira, Sohag and Assiut.

Indirect targeted groups in the project:

- 75,000 women, men, girls and young men from the four targeted governorates are improving their social and economic conditions as a result of small grants

CHILD PROTECTION PROJECT

The child protection project works in all Assiut centers (11 centers in Assiut and the East and West neighborhood) in cooperation with the UNICEF, and the project targets children at risk

 Monitoring and managing the situation of 2000 children annually in need of care and protection through the protection committees in Assiut Governorate

 Building the capacity of 26 social workers in all Assiut centers and improving their skills to discover cases of interference in protecting children.



 Managing cases in Assiut Governorate through NGOs and governmental organizations concerned with children at risk

•The work of the second coordination meeting for the various institutions (health – youth and sports – social solidarity) as well as the directors of child protection units in the governorates and in the presence of a working group from USAID and representatives of the UNICEF and the staff of the Childhood and Development Association to present– :

•UNICEF areas of work, data and statistics on female circumcision, presented what happened in Burkina Faso and ACDA representation at that conference, and spoke about Egyptian efforts to combat female circumcision

EMPOWERING WOMEN ECONOMICALLY PORJECT



The project of economic empowerment centers for women works in the governorates of Assiut, Sohag, Qena and Cairo, in cooperation with Orange Telecom Egypt. The project targets girls and women.

The overall goal

Providing a space for 1500 girls and women to increase their skills to improve their economic situation in the governorates of Assiut, Sohag, Qena and Cairo, using information technology during the year

Sub goals

Providing 10 centers to empower women economically, using computers and tablets, in villages and cities in the targeted governorates.

Empowering 1500 women and girls economically, by providing opportunities to increase their skills to start a small business using information technology.

Implementing 1,000 women and girls for a small project within a year.

-10 civil societies embrace women's economic empowerment through women's empowerment centers.

The results of the project.

- 10 women's empowerment centers that were operated and equipped with digital devices

- 1500 women trained on how to implement a small project

- 1000 women implemented a small project
- 10 non-governmental organizations adopted economically empowering women

Target group.

Direct beneficiary (girls and women)

Indirect beneficiary (families of girls, women and the surrounding community)

Activities:

1- Implement 10 introductory meetings for the project with the targeted communities

– A number of 9 introductory meetings have been implemented to market women's empowerment centers in the targeted areas of the project in order to increase the attendance rates of women and girls to the centers and inform them about them and the services provided by the centers to them. The implementation of those meetings came at the level of 3 governorates, namely Assiut, Sohag and Qena, with a total number of 525 women and girls attending

- Those meetings benefited the women wishing to implement a project, where a number of difficulties were encountered that the women implementing the projects already existing when implementing a project in terms of marketing and the management of capital needed to start a small project, where they transferred their experience and their experience to many women.

- These meetings highlighted a number of successful positive examples that have explored girls and women on foot by implementing a small project with the least financial means without fear of the possibility of failure and without waiting for work opportunities.

2- Connecting women with associations that provide microcredit with concessional terms for this category such as the Society for Childhood and Development in Assiut and the Association of Businesswomen and other associations in the various governorates in which the project is implemented to ensure continuity (where the associations that have a micro-lending activity are chosen to ensure continued service provision

As for the women who set up a small project, most of the women implemented it from their own financial resources without resorting to borrowing from the authorities that provide microcredit, except for a very small number who did not borrow. The philosophy of most of the women in that was at the large project and becoming an entity and they have experience then they borrow from these parties because with the beginning of the project they lack expertise and they cannot put themselves in a dangerous position.

2- The women who got the training of the center

The number of women beneficiaries that completed the training program for how to start your project reached 1923 women throughout the project period, while the target number according to the proposal is 1500 girls and women, at the level of 4 governorates

3– Women who implemented small projects after receiving training: After completing the training, many women started implementing a small project

The type of projects that have been implemented, such as: (ready-made clothes – household tools – sewing – raising birds – groceries – handicrafts and accessories – detergents – candy making – library and photography) with a total of 506 women

4- Participate and register in the amazing women competition

3 women who implemented projects through women's empowerment centers were submitted to run for the competition announced by Orange Telecom, and they have ambitions to increase and expand their projects through applying for this competition. These projects helped in raising their economic level. Accordingly, the results of the competition appeared with the victory of 3 women candidates implemented for small projects with a total amount of 30,000 pounds at the two governorates level, Assiut and Sohag.

Achievements

- Many girls and women enter the economic empowerment centers for women in all the targeted areas of the project, especially after the completion of the first training session, because they touched them on a great benefit accruing to them in how to implement small projects with very limited financial capabilities scientifically.

- The desire of many parties neighboring the target areas of the project to implement their women's centers

- Some women and girls who have implemented projects previously joined women's empowerment centers to learn how to market their products, and some of them have also learned how to overcome failure in the projects they have implemented

Difficulties

- Some women fear that the project will fail before the start because of the lack of experience or knowledge of how to plan the project, and through introductory meetings, the experience was transferred to them through the women who already implement the project.

- Some women are convinced that the project should start large and not gradually, and that there are projects that need sums that are not large, with which it is difficult to risk starting the project.

- Some customs and traditions in the villages prohibit girls and women from carrying out any economic project on the pretext that the girl has a family and it is not correct for her to help herself in any way through introductory meetings. Some girls and women who implement a small project made it clear that they convinced their families that the girl should have an entity and to depend on itself to improve its economic situation

- Some of the women are in a financial condition that does not allow them to implement a project and cannot take a loan due to the difficulty of loan conditions in some regions in terms of the guarantor being a government employee and the high interest of the loan

Lessons learned

After some women's empowerment centers for the target group, the center was moved to their whereabouts so that they can benefit from the training.

OUR SPACE PROJECT

Our space project works in the centers of Abu Tig and Manfalut villages (Balayza, Abu Tij



Qebli, Al Mandara and Bani Rafeh) and in cooperation with the Plan International Egypt, and the project targets the executive associations of the project, government and youth

The overall goal

Supporting marginalized groups to participate in decision-making at the local and national levels, including all parties concerned.
